

WHERE TO GO

Old Town of Tallinn has been inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

6 Dominican Monastery
The oldest cloister centre in the downtown area was founded in the mid-13th century. Today it is surrounded with genuine handicraft workshops, boutiques and cosy cafes.

8 Town Hall Pharmacy
The oldest functioning pharmacy in the world was first mentioned in 1422.

7 The Holy Ghost Church
The church in the middle of Old Town was first mentioned in 1316. It has the oldest clock in Tallinn.

5 St. Olaf's Church
It is one of the most imposing Gothic Churches of the Medieval Europe, first mentioned in 1287. Around 1500, the building reached the height of 159 m, and became the world's tallest building of the time.

1 Town Hall
The best preserved Gothic town hall in Northern Europe has preserved the basic structure of the town from the 13th century.

2 St. Nicholas Church
The church preserves the beautifully carved main altar that dates from the 15th century. It's also a unique Centre of Oest's Playgroup, and St. Anthony's altar.

3 Alexander Nevski Cathedral
Cathedral's largest cupola contains the altar, the most significant symbol of the city's development stage of Russian colonization.

4 Thomas Castle and Pikk Toompea
The medieval stone castle was built in the 13th century and has served as one of the most significant symbols of the city since. Today, the Estonian Parliament is located here. The tallest tower that served as the 40-metre-high tower called Tall Hermann.

9 Town Wall
Some of the city walls with 28 defensive towers have preserved their 2 km of the city's former Tallinn's medieval part of the town. The city walls were destroyed in Northern Estonia, and during the war in 1944. At that time, the walls were 10-12 metres high, and stretched for 4 km around the city with 40 defensive towers.
